MEET OUR BOARD OF DIRECTORS

What roles have you held as a volunteer?

I started out by taking in artwork for the Members' Exhibition. I shadowed Heidi Nelson which gave me an idea of what the board does to get ready for a show. There is a lot involved — venue, juror choices, dates, programs, signage, fund raising, marketing/advertising, awards, award presentation, and technical help. I did what I am good at, calligraphy, as well as making and printing the programs, and baking for the reception.

Then I joined the National Exhibition Committee because I wanted to learn about what is done behind the scenes. I learned about the cost and how many people it takes to accomplish a smooth-running show. I did not plan to take over as the Chair this year, but I signed up when I learned that Janice Anderson was resigning. She told me the members of this national team were the best!

What has been the most fun and most challenging?

I am learning how to work with other artists instead of doing everything myself. I don't usually work in a group, but I appreciate people who are willing to keep me in the loop. I hope to learn from new artists and help others learn also.

Why did you decide to serve?

I had decided to volunteer because my time was freed up in my personal life and I was curious about what it takes to set up an exhibition.

Tell us a little about yourself.

I am a strong-willed Irish person who takes pride in independence. I put myself through college against my parents' wishes using my own funds. I earned a teaching degree in art and, later, two master's degrees from St. Mary's University. I have entered many art shows and festivals, including the Minnesota State Fair. When I started an Open Art Studio/Gallery/School, I cut down on the number of outside shows.

Because I have had many years of chronic pain, a car accident, and cancer, I have found the best way to keep working is to not be in the mainstream so that I can work at my own pace. I have been mostly self-employed with stretches of working within groups.

My husband and I raised our family in East Grand Forks and St Paul. I have two grown children and six grandchildren.

Tell us about your artistic experience and interests.

My interests have always been in the arts. Besides drawing, painting, and calligraphy, I also enjoy singing in the choir, playing piano, canoeing, fishing, camping, hiking, bike riding, gardening, and baking.

I have worked professionally with a television station, advertising/graphic design agencies, and with printers/screen printing. I have illustrated children's books and an immigration book; painted murals for restaurants; created pen and ink drawings of buildings, houses, cabins, and churches; greeting/note cards; and play sets - backgrounds for plays. I taught K-12 art for 10 years and adult art classes for 50 years. I apply to many shows on CaFè. I have shown my artwork regionally, nationally, and internationally.

ARTREACH FOR JUSTICE

This column highlights artists, places, and events in keeping with our commitment to work toward a more inclusive, just, and equitable art community. Our focus this year is on artists of color who have made important historical contributions to the wider art world.

And the Migrants Kept Coming: Helen Zughaib and Jacob Lawrence



"'And the migrants kept coming' is a refrain of triumph over adversity. If it rings true for you today, then it must still strike a chord in our American experience" (Jacob Lawrence, (1)).

I set out to profile an Arab American painter, Helen Zughaib (1959-), whose ink-and-gouache paintings I so admire, with their vivid colors, geometric patterns, and bold, flat shapes. I didn't realize this would lead me straight to another of my favorite painters, Jacob Lawrence (1917-2000) who was profiled in a

previous newsletter. Lawrence, an African American artist, painted his "Migration Series," in 1940-1941, about the migration of African Americans from the American South to the industrial North after World War I. This inspired the young Arab American artist, Zughaib, to create her "Syrian Migration Series" in 2016-2018. Zughaib's series strives to tell the story of 13 million Syrian migrants and refugees fleeing war, poverty, drought, bombs, and starvation, beginning in 2011.

Helen Zughaib was born in Beirut, Lebanon, but civil war forced her family to flee to Greece, leaving everything behind, including her father. She decided early that she would be an artist and was ultimately able to study art when her family immigrated to the U.S.

Years later, while beginning her career as an artist in Washington DC, Zughaib visited the Phillips Collection (modern art museum) where she saw Jacob Lawrence's Migration Series. She was overcome with emotion. Although she had never heard of

Lawrence, she was immediately drawn to his art and narrative. In addition to his use of color, line, and flat shapes so much like her own style of painting, she found that he used gouache, her favorite paint! When she met Lawrence several years later at The Phillips, she started crying, thus missing out on her one chance to tell him how much his work had moved and inspired her. But she wrote about Lawrence, "His stories have endured and speak to us louder now, maybe even more than ever. I have been listening to him all along. I hope others will do the same (2)."
