

I love meeting other artists, finding inspiration in their artwork, and learning new techniques. Movement and light feature prominently in my current style. I'm working on my newest challenge for 2023: adding a range of color values to create depth in my artwork (watercolor paintings, mosaics, and stained glass).





Calvin deRuyter



Art, like life, should be about embracing change. After working for 25 years in the visual arts, I am currently focused on new beginnings. I have moved from landscapes into non-objective abstracts; from bright, overwhelming colors to the more subtle; and from watercolor into the mixture of new (for me) watermedia.

In mentoring, I want to move away from specific techniques and help others find their own paths, focusing on an understanding of the elements and principles of visual art.

I spend half of the year at my studio in Evansville, MN, and the other half in sunny Arizona.

ARTREACH FOR JUSTICE

This column highlights artists, places, and events in keeping with our commitment to work toward a more inclusive, just, and equitable art community. This year we will expand our reach a little with the inclusion of artists from other countries, as with this issue.

Amit Kapoor

Amit Kapoor is a leading master of the watercolor medium in India. He has been recognized with top international honors for his paintings and his art graces the walls of many private and corporate collectors. Painting with watercolors is one of his greatest delights and has now become an addiction for him too. He finds an ultimate bliss while painting and for him art is just like meditation.

His subjects include compositional works like streets, kitchens, platforms, and metropolitan cities where a lovely play of light and shadow and perspectives are the main traits. He has a passion for painting railway engines and platforms and has beautifully captured the hustle bustle of the platforms and the smoke of the engines in his paintings. He truly believes in the saying that "The Practice of Art isn't to make a living but to make your soul grow".

Kapoor was profiled in the Winter 2023 issue of *Watercolor Artist Magazine*, from which this material was taken. He is the principal of an art school in New Delhi and the president of the Watercolor Society of India. He attended an art event in Thailand some years ago which introduced him to several internationally renowned watercolorists. That, in turn, led to a connection to the International Watercolor Society and inspired him to head up a new branch in India. Much of his time recently is spent traveling, teaching in Europe, Australia, Spain, and Thailand, for example. He says, "I'm just traveling and enjoying my life."







His painting process begins with setting up the scene. He doesn't think of the arrangement before him as a given but as visual material ready to be framed and composed as he would like. He starts with simple pencil sketches that note the main masses and lines of perspectives. With a very critical eye, he determines whether they will make an engaging composition. If it's not working, he doesn't paint it. If he decides to proceed, he'll develop the composition with thumbnails. Only when fully satisfied, does he start painting. He is quoted as saying, "Composition is the most important part of your painting. It's a foundation on which the rest of the painting is built."

Rochester Art Center - Nicole Havekost: Matriarchate

January 11 - April 2, 2023

The Rochester Art Center presents a solo exhibition of monumental sculptures and multimedia installations by Rochester-based artist Nicole Havekost. The fabric sculptures resembling giant, uniquely proportioned women figures - the artist colloquially refers to them as "ladies" - were originally created for her solo exhibition at the Minneapolis Institute of Art in 2020. For *Matriarchate*, Havekost has designed new figures that will be built during the opening reception and completed during the length of the exhibition. This is a unique opportunity for the audience to directly engage with the artistic process of Havekost and have a glance at the invisible labor that is needed to create a large-scale sculpture.

The building has a long commitment to the arts, community, and arts sustainability in the area. Building owners, John Kremer and Jennifer Young purchased the property in 1991 and have rented studios to artists ever since. With over 80 artists as tenants, the building is an anchor in the NE Minneapolis Arts District.

Douglas Flanders Art & Associates Fine Art Gallery: Feel the Warmth

Through January 28

DF&A presents an exhibition featuring vintage figurines from Dayton's 8th Floor Holiday Shows, as well as Quilts by Gee's Bend, Linda Keene and Diane Semanko. Hennepin Theatre Trust holds 34 of the vintage figurines that once graced Dayton's annual Holiday Show events in downtown Minneapolis. The set of 34 figurines, some of which are decades old and have not been on view since the 1980s, need significant repair to return to their full splendor, including animation. This year's display of five near-fully refurbished figurines kicks off a fundraising effort to renovate and repair all 34 figurines. The quilts are cool too.

Katherine E. Nash Gallery - A Tender Spirit, A Vital Form: Arlene Burke-Morgan & Clarence Morgan

Ticketed Program and Reception (free): Saturday, January 21, 2023

100 paintings, drawings, sculptures, and related ephemera. Arlene Burke-Morgan (1950-2017) and Clarence Morgan (b. 1950) epitomized the artist-couple: in love with each other and devoted not only to their art but also to their family and faith, and to the wider community of students and artists. Originally from Philadelphia, they moved to Minneapolis in 1992 when Clarence Morgan joined the faculty in the Department of Art at the University of Minnesota. Arlene Burke-Morgan also taught as a lecturer in the Department of Art from 1992 to 1996. Clarence Morgan retired his position as Professor of Art at the end of 2021.
